Context

- Traditionally in the homelessness sector, housing outcomes have been obtained via a number of pathways
- More recently, the City began to develop and implement Coordinated Access a new systems-level approach for addressing homelessness that provides a consistent way to assess, prioritize and connect people experiencing homelessness to City-funded housing & supports
- Permanent housing outcomes are obtained through both City-coordinated mechanisms, as well as traditional pathways to housing including:
 - Housing worker assistance to access private market units, independent of City-administered supports
 - Returning home or to family
 - Discharged to a long-term care facility
 - Discharged to supportive housing
 - Discharged to social housing opportunity
- Many City services and community agencies in Toronto are doing pivotal work in the homelessness sector to connect individuals to housing. These opportunities may be accessed through the Coordinated Access system, or they may be accessed via other channels.






Housing Outcomes – City coordinated Programs 2020-2022

Discharged to Permanent Housing



- Permanent housing outcomes can be obtained via Coordinated Access or via other channels
- Permanent housing outcomes are influenced at the population level
 - For example, refugees are often able to be more quickly housed due to different needs and housing location considerations than other populations within the shelter system
