
Land Acknowledgement

TAEH Municipal Election Plan

The 2022 Municipal Election is on October 24th and the TAEH aims to highlight the need for urgent action towards ending homelessness in Toronto by encouraging candidates running for office to make concrete commitments to prioritizing tangible solutions that they can be held accountable to, if elected.

We know what ends homelessness.

- \Box It is housing.
- It is providing the supports a person may need in order to find and keep their housing.
- □ It is a coordinated, data-driven system.
- And it is a responsive emergency shelter system that delivers housingfocussed services for people seeking refuge at their doors.

Homelessness in Toronto is a crisis that is getting worse and not better.

More people experience homelessness than ever before in our city, and the services, both emergency shelter and housing, are at a breaking point in being able to adequately help people find the supports and housing they need.

Homelessness is the result of a combination of poverty, a lack of affordable housing and difficult personal circumstances. Its cost in human lives, potential, and suffering is not acceptable for any just or compassionate society.

This election presents an opportunity to create a strong commitment to doing what is needed to end homelessness. Candidates vying to represent us on the new Council must make ending homelessness a priority, committing to real, tangible actions they will support once elected.

TAEH Pledge to End Homelessness

The TAEH is asking all candidates to commit to:

- Making ending homelessness through housing solutions a top City priority in the coming term.
- A minimum housing access target for people experiencing homelessness.
- Increase financial resources, dedicating them to this target, in a new fund to make homelessness being rare, brief, and non-recurring.
- Ensure that appropriate targets and resources are allocated to For Indigenous, By Indigenous housing strategies, in direct proportion to the overrepresentation those communities experience in demographics of homelessness.
- Create a new Advisory Committee on ending homelessness.
- Developing a Toronto Ending Homelessness Plan


What can you do?
